

# Child Safety and Wellbeing Policy

#### 1. COMPLIANCE OBLIGATION SUPPORTED

#### 2. PURPOSE

This policy outlines the University's commitment to promoting the safety and wellbeing of <u>children</u> connected to the University's activities.

#### 3. POLICY STATEMENT

- **3.1.** The University acknowledges that children are part of the University community including as students, staff, the dependents of staff and students, visitors to the University's campuses and through the University's research projects, community engagement and school outreach activities.
- **3.2.** The University does not tolerate child abuse and promotes child safety and wellbeing through a range of measures including:
  - the provision of regular education, training and communication to employees, University Associates and other parties in relation to child safety, conduct and behaviour;
  - (b) the implementation of risk assessment, management and mitigation strategies to mitigate child safety risks;
  - (c) recruitment and employment processes, including in relation to Working With Children Check, National Police Certificate assessment and other screening;
  - (d) research processes that consider, assess and manage child safety risks;
  - (e) procurement processes that require due diligence with respect to suppliers' track record on child safety; and
  - (f) reporting processes that provide individuals with mechanisms to report concerns, and for trends and exceptions related to child safety to be identified and reported to the University's governance bodies and external regulatory bodies.
- **3.3.** The University will, where appropriate, inform children of their rights and invite the participation of children and their families in decisions, policies, procedures and processes that affect them.
- **3.4.** The University has appointed a Child Safety Champion to promote awareness of child safety across the University and to be a point of contact for matters relating to child safety. The Child Safety Champion is the Chief Operating Officer.
- **3.5.** Any individual can make or provide a report, complaint, allegation or expression of concern in relation to child safety through the <u>Integrity and Standards Unit</u>. See the <u>Child Safety and Wellbeing Procedures</u> for further details.

## 4. SCOPE OF POLICY

This policy applies to the University community, including Council members, students, employees, University Associates, Curtin controlled entities, and all persons (including children) participating in University business or activities, including whether as a visitor, adjunct appointee, service provider, contractor or volunteer.
