2. PURPOSE

Curtin seeks to foster a culture which values and rewards technology transfer and entrepreneurial endeavour; promotes collaboration between the University, staff and industry; and maximises the benefits to Australia from publicly funded research. Curtin encourages staff to actively engage in commercialisation of intellectual property (IP) and be rewarded for that activity.

The <u>Intellectual Property Policy and Procedures</u> facilitate good practice and clarity of ownership when considering identification, protection, management and <u>commercialisation</u> of <u>IP</u>.

3. POLICY STATEMENT

3.1 Ownership of IP by employees

- 3.1.1 Unless otherwise agreed in writing, the University owns all <u>IP</u> developed, created, authored or otherwise contributed to by an employee:
 - (a) in their course of duties; or
 - (b) pursuant to a University project,

that is not <u>artistic work</u>, <u>scholarly work</u> or <u>indigenous cultural and intellectual property (ICIP)</u>. This ownership is not impacted by whether or not the employee's involvement was outside of work hours or used resources other than <u>University resources</u>.

3.1.2 If an employee develops, creates or authors <u>IP</u> that is not related in any way to their <u>course of duties</u> or a <u>University project</u> and has not used any <u>University resources</u> in developing, creating or authoring that IP, then the employee owns that IP.

3.2 Ownership of IP developed, created or authored by students

A student owns <u>IP</u> developed, created or authored by them during their period of admission at the University, except where the <u>IP</u> arises from participation in a <u>University Project</u>, in which case the University will own the <u>IP</u>, unless otherwise agreed in writing with the student.

3.3 Scholarly work and artistic work

The University does not assert ownership over the IP in scholarly work or artistic work.

3.4 Indigenous cultural and intellectual property

- 3.4.1 The University acknowledges that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities are the custodians of their <u>ICIP</u> and have an interest in protecting their <u>ICIP</u> from exploitation that is contrary to their customary laws.
- 3.4.2 The University aims to give appropriate recognition, protection and respect to <u>ICIP</u> and its owners by ensuring that:
 - (a) <u>ICIP</u> is used for a purpose permitted by the owners of the <u>ICIP</u> with informed consent and, if required, continued consent of its owners;
 - (b) the ownership of ICIP made available for use in research and University

Projects is not affected by that use;

- (c) <u>ICIP</u> is not used (obtained, appropriated, claimed, or <u>commercialised</u>) without the prior approval of the <u>ICIP</u> owners and any use occurs on mutually agreed terms;
 - (i) that owners of <u>ICIP</u> can expect that activities, projects and research conducted utilising their <u>ICIP</u> will be of benefit to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, and that there is an equitable sharing of any benefits arising from the use of ICIP with those communities; and
 - (ii) the University respects any Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander sacred site that is the subject of research and project work.
- 3.4.3 Where applicable, the University will collaborate in good faith to implement or develop protocols for implementing, in relation to ICIP, the <u>Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies Code of Ethics for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Research.</u>

3.5 Moral rights

- 3.5.1 The University acknowledges the moral rights of <u>originators</u> as provided in the <u>Copyright Act 1968 (Cth)</u> including the right of fair attribution and the need for work not to be altered or used in a way that harms the reputation of the originator.
- 3.5.2 Where <u>IP</u> is created during a <u>University Project</u>, <u>originators</u> may be required to provide a written waiver of moral rights to the <u>IP</u> in favour of the University or a third party.

3.6 Commercialisation

- 3.6.1 Where the University decides to <u>commercialise IP</u>, <u>originators</u> will be rewarded by receiving a portion of the <u>Net Revenue</u> received by the University or as otherwise set out in the <u>Intellectual Property Procedures</u>.
- 3.6.2 Where the University decides not to <u>commercialise IP</u> or to discontinue commercialisation already undertaken, the University may assign <u>Ownership</u> in the <u>IP</u> to the originator(s).

4. SCOPE OF POLICY

This Policy applies to all members of the University community (which includes Council members, students, employees, <u>University Associates</u>, Curtin controlled entities, and all persons participating in University business or activities, including whether as a visitor, adjunct appointee, service provider, or contractor).

5. **DEFINITIONS**

(Note: Commonly defined terms are located in the <u>Curtin Common Definitions</u>. Any defined terms below are specific to this document)

Artistic Works

A painting, sculpture, drawing, engraving, photograph or any other work of artistic craftsmanship created or made for the sole purpose of aesthetic or artistic merit.

Commercialisation or Commercialise

In relation to <u>IP</u> means to make, sell, copy, adapt, apply, publish, develop, use, assign, license or otherwise use the <u>IP</u> for the purpose of generating financial or other commercial gains. This definition excludes tuition fees and student contribution amounts paid by students.

Course of Duties

The scope of duties as set out in the terms and conditions of any relevant enterprise bargaining agreement, contract of employment, duty statement or any other agreement between the individual and the University in effect at the time at which the IP was generated.

Indigenous cultural and intellectual property (ICIP)

The interests of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander people in their culture, heritage and knowledge

and includes the intangible and tangible aspects of their cultural practices, cultural expressions, resources and knowledge systems that have been and continue to be developed, nurtured and refined as part of expressing their cultural identity and includes any applicable cultural rights in favour of Australian Indigenous people that may be given effect under Australian law.

Intellectual Property (IP)

All statutory and other proprietary rights anywhere in the world, whether registered or unregistered, in relation to:

- (a) a patent, application for a patent, invention, manner, method or process of manufacture, or method or principle of construction as defined in the *Patents Act 1990* (Cth);
- (b) a copyright work as defined in the Copyright Act 1968 (Cth);
- (c) a design as defined in the *Designs Act 1906* (Cth);
- (d) a plant variety as defined in the <u>Plant Breeders' Rights Act 1994 (Cth)</u>;
- (e) a circuit layout or semi-conductor chip layout or design or eligible layout as defined in the Circuit Layouts Act 1989 (Cth);
- (f) a trade mark as defined in the *Trade Marks Act 1995* (Cth);

and all other rights as defined by Article 2 of the Convention Establishing the World <u>Intellectual</u> <u>Property</u> Organisation. It includes related rights and confidential information and know-how in relation to the above rights, or as otherwise determined by the University.

Net Revenue

In relation to a particular item or related items of <u>IP</u>, the <u>revenue</u> remaining after the deduction by the University of its reasonable costs incurred in the protection and <u>commercialisation</u> of <u>University IP</u>, including but not limited to an appropriate allowance for risk, in that particular item or related items of IP.

Originator

A person who develops, creates or authors <u>IP</u>, whether or not in conjunction with another person.

Revenue

The gross proceeds received by the University as a result of <u>commercialisation</u> of <u>University IP</u>. This will include but not be limited to any amount in the form of upfront fees, milestone payments, royalties, dividends and the proceeds from sale of shares in cases where shares have not been issued directly to <u>originator(s)</u> in consideration for their contribution. It specifically excludes:

- (a) research and development funds;
- (b) grants and direct investments;
- (c) donations from the University, sponsors or other third-parties; and
- (d) gross proceeds received by the University as a result of <u>commercialisation</u> of <u>teaching</u> <u>materials</u> and work commissioned by the University.

Scholarly Works

Any article, book, textbook, manual, manuscript or other material prepared or created by an employee in their <u>course of duties</u> for educational or scholarly purposes, but does not include <u>teaching materials</u>.

Sponsor

A third party, external agency or industry partner which has entered into an agreement with the University to undertake research or other services.

Teaching materials

Materials whether in electronic, written or any other form produced by University employees or students or commissioned by the University for use in, or in conjunction with, without limitation, a course, subject or unit offered or to be offered by or on behalf of the University or by an affiliated open learning or distance education agency. It includes without limitation lecture notes and material, syllabi, handouts, study guides, course software and assessment materials regardless of format (for example, printed, digital, electronic, multi-media presentations and web content). It

excludes personal lecture notes by employees that are not made available to students or personal notes taken by students to assist in study. If any work may be considered both <u>teaching materials</u> and scholarly or artistic works, for the purpose of this policy it will be treated as teaching materials.

University Associate

Any visiting academic, adjunct appointed to the University, any honorary or emeritus appointee or any person who is a member of another educational or research institution, and is engaged in teaching, research or other activities of the University.

University IP

<u>IP</u> owned by the University according to the terms of the <u>Intellectual Property Policy</u> or <u>Procedures</u> or otherwise as a matter of law.

University Project

Work or research administered by or on behalf of the University which:

- (a) is funded wholly or in part by a sponsor; or
- (b) is commissioned or otherwise funded by the University; or
- (c) uses or incorporates <u>University IP</u> or <u>University resources</u> or both; or is a collaborative project, which is either:
 - (i) a program of work conducted by more than one <u>originator</u>, where each <u>originator's</u> contribution to the <u>IP</u> cannot be separated from the contribution made by other <u>originators</u>; or
 - (ii) a program of work that originates from, or is an improvement to, University IP.

University Resources

Resources belonging to the University including without limitation, premises; infrastructure; facilities; funds; services; equipment; paid leave; and employee or <u>University Associate's</u> time.
