Gender equality: what's taking us so long?

According to the United Nations, the world is not on track to achieve gender equality by 2030.

At the current rate, it will take 300 years to end child marriage, 286 years to close gaps in legal protection and remove discriminatory laws, and 140 years to achieve equal representation in leadership in the workplace.



Issues such as poverty, education, and global health all contribute to this gender imbalance. However, what are the root causes and how can we accelerate the activity that will have a real impact and bring us closer to a truer global equality?

Empowering Women in Regional Communities

Professor Jane Coffey from the School of Management and Marketing, alongside Hannah Wilkinson from FBL Student Engagement, led the ‘Career Ready in the Regions’ workshop in Carnarvon.

In collaboration with the RRR Network and the Gascoyne Development Commission, this transformative two-day event equipped women with essential tools to navigate their current and future career journeys. The initiative focused on building participants' confidence and skills, empowering them to break barriers and seize new career opportunities. The Shire of Carnarvon CEO, Amanda Dexter, also participated, sharing her personal career story and engaging with attendees.

Since its launch, the ‘Career Ready in the Regions’ workshop series has connected with over 130 women across Kalgoorlie, Geraldton, Karratha, Broome, Narrogin, Albany, Bunbury, and now Carnarvon. Each workshop highlights the importance of fostering professional growth and supporting the aspirations of women in regional areas.

Decent work and economic growth

2024 WTO public forum

Dr Sharmin Tania, Lecturer at Curtin Law School recently organised a panel for the 2024 World Trade Organization (WTO) Public Forum, themed 'Re-globalization: Better Trade for a Better World'.

Her panel, titled 'Green Policies for Inclusive Trade and Climate Justice', was held in Geneva and brought together a distinguished group of experts including:

- Associate Professor Ilaria Espa, USI Lugano and Senior Research Fellow at the World Trade Institute, Switzerland.
- Associate Professor Zaker Ahmad, University of Chittagong, Bangladesh, and Georg Forster Postdoctoral Research Fellow, University of Göttingen, Germany.
- Dr Al Amin Pramanik, Economic Minister at the Permanent Mission of Bangladesh to the United Nations, Geneva.



Dr Tania had the privilege of moderating the 70-minute session and the panel engaged in a thought-provoking discussion about making trade-related climate policies inclusive for least developed, low-income, and small island developing countries.

Dimensions and prevalence of decent work in Australia

The Bankwest Curtin Economics Centre, in partnership with HESTA, has released new research on decent work in Australia, aligned with the UN's Sustainable Development Goal 8 (SDG8), which promotes decent work and economic growth.

The research suggests that decent work, characterised by job security, good work conditions, manageable stress, and flexibility, contrasts with precarious work. Using data from the HILDA survey, the report tracks trends in decent work across various industries and demographics.

The Centre, established in 2012 at Curtin University, aims to improve understanding of economic and social issues impacting Australians.

Curtin University and Rio Tinto Iron Ore collaboration

There has been an exciting collaboration between Curtin University and Rio Tinto Iron Ore (RTIO) to design a series of professional development masterclasses for the RTIO Leadership Excellence Program for Superintendents.

Delivered by the RTIO Leadership Academy, the program aims to establish a consistent standard of leadership that fosters a physically and psychologically safe workplace.

The five one-day Curtin Executive Education masterclasses cover essential topics such as Project Management, Managerial Effectiveness, Leading Diversity, and Emotional Intelligence and Psychological Resilience.

Mental awareness, respect and safety (MARS)

This year a cohort of FBL staff attended the walk at Langley Park, Boorloo (Perth), which featured a Welcome to Country and key speakers before the commencement of the Walk, with multiple Smoking Ceremony fire pits for the walkers to pass through, before ending in solidarity at the Supreme Court Gardens.

Curtin Tax Clinic funding report

The Curtin Tax Clinic's final report following the conclusion of grant funding provided by the [National Indigenous Australians Agency](#) outlined numerous successful outcomes.

Over the course of 12 months this funding enabled the CTC to assist 798 clients by lodging 1,443 tax returns which resulted in tax refunds totalling \$460,569. In addition to this, the team provided numerous educational seminars and workshops to boost the financial literacy of participants based in metropolitan, regional and remote areas in WA, while also assisting with other tax-related matters such as setting up myGov and consolidating superannuation accounts.

Curtin scholarships celebration event

The recent event celebrating the recipients of Curtin Scholarships was attended by approximately 200 donors, scholarship recipients and Curtin colleagues to network and hear first-hand the transformational power a scholarship can provide.

FBL students Lilia Pearce and Caleb Shipp were recipients of the John Curtin Undergraduate Scholarship, Ebony Whitney received the Julia Gillard Women in Leadership Scholarship, and Christine Scruton was the recipient of the Capital Partners Scholarship in Financial Planning.




Climate action

Carbon literacy bronze accreditation

We are thrilled to announce that we have been accredited as a Bronze Carbon Literate Educator by the UN-recognised Carbon Literacy Project. This prestigious accreditation recognises our commitment to embed climate education and action, through Carbon Literacy, into our educational institution and ethos, and facilitate a cultural shift toward a zero-carbon society.

There are now 100,000 Carbon Literate people worldwide, and both staff and students from the Curtin Faculty of Business and Law are among them!



Two Carbon Literacy training programs have been held this year and we were proud to see representation from Curtin MBA Programs, the Curtin Centre for Applied Ethics, the Curtin Institute of Energy Transition and students from various disciplines.

This cohort is crucial role in embedding Carbon Literacy principles and sustainable development into our curriculum, ensuring future leaders are equipped to drive change.

ESG evolutions: How to respond and change

The Curtin Centre for Applied Ethics hosted a series of industry events ESG Evolutions: How to Respond and Change, providing industry professionals and academics an opportunity to network and be part of the conversations needed to stay ahead of the curve in environmental, social, and governance (ESG) practices.
